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## Caged Birds – In Case of Emergency/Disaster

If you have to leave your home quickly in an emergency, this list will help keep your pet bird safe and provide County Animal Response Workers with helpful information.

### Have a Bird Emergency Plan

- Do you have enough carriers for each bird?
- Can the cage be locked and carried safely?
- Is the cage clearly marked with owner's information?

### Have an Emergency Kit for your Bird

You will need:

Non-perishable food and water (3-5 days worth)

Extra bowls for food and water (3-5 days worth)

Paper towels

Bird carrier lined with newspaper

The carrier should have your name/address/phone number on it and secondary contact information.

Towels and a blanket to cover the cage

Some bird toys

Perch(s)

Your bird's medical record and microchip number or leg-band information.

A photo of you with your bird and any distinctive character traits listed on the back.

Some people know what a "parrot" is but not a Conure.

A copy of legal documents indicating where you want our birds placed if you cannot care for them anymore.

### Prepare a First Aid Kit for your Bird/Parrot

Bandaging material, like gauze roll

Sterile lubricant

Alcohol swabs

Scissors

Microwave or chemical heating pad

Sterile saline and syringes
